OUR NEWEST PAUL HARRIS FELLOW

At the Rotary Club of Longreach's handover night, I had the privilege of presenting a Paul Harris Fellow to Past President, John Beattie. I believe all present that night, except for John's wife and outgoing President, Elizabeth, learnt a lot about John and his service to Rotary and to Longreach and the broader western Queensland community that night. Here is just a sample:

- A club member of 27 years standing and served in all executive and service directorships
- Past honorary councillor for the Longreach Shire and Board member of the Longreach Hospital, Longreach Fire Service and Pioneer Home.
- Foundation member of Australian Stockman's Hall of Fame
- Treasurer and co-organiser of Longreach's Centenary Pageant
- Driving force behind the establishment of rugby union in Longreach and western Queensland.
- Initiated junior cricket in Longreach
- Coached rugby league under 8's

In typical un-assuming outback fashion, John maintained that he had gained more from the work of others in the community than he had contributed himself, and that his work for sport was for the benefit of his (now adult) sons, David and Robert. Both had travelled from Brisbane on the pretext of a mate's party, to be part of this special night.



AUGUST IS MEMBERSHIP AND EXTENSION MONTH

While Membership is the theme for August, it is a subject that needs to be to the fore in our thoughts for the 12 months of each and every Rotary year. In fact it is a subject that no Club can avoid if it is taking a long term look at its prospects of staying in business. Indeed we must recruit just to stand still - that is, just to replace those members who will leave for all sorts of reasons. In the past few years, District active membership has contracted by around 200, or on average about 4 members per club. As a group we are not even standing still. There are of course Clubs who have managed to grow, and at the end of my Club visits I will be looking at common factors that may help other Clubs to turn the membership tide.

For the benefit of newer members Extension refers to the establishment of new Clubs (and Districts). It has been the means by which RI globally has been able to maintain its numbers for several years now.

Identifying prospective members has been made easier as the result of an important change approved at the recent Council on Legislation. A genuine track record in community service is now equivalent to a vocation. This means that service oriented people who may have not previously met Rotary's business and professional criteria are now eligible. All Clubs and Rotarians need to be aware of this.

In this Rotary year I am encouraging all clubs to plan for, and achieve a Presidential Citation. The citation is awarded by the RI President to those clubs that accomplish a small set of activities from a large range of options. This year RI President Wilf Wilkinson has set one mandatory requirement – a net growth of one member. The quest for new members needs to be a continuous activity, and while membership drives are encouraged, they should be seen as a supplement, rather than an alternative, to the continuous approach.

I believe that public profile, and Public Relations are an integral part of attracting and holding members. Human nature suggests that prospective members will be easier to attract if they already know that Rotary does great things, and is widely respected. They may even seek us out, and want to join. It is not surprising that the Club organisational structure being promoted by RI under the banner "Club Leadership Plan" gives equal prominence to Membership and Public Relations as it does to Service Projects. These are survival issues for Rotary and must get the attention they deserve.

One of the most compelling comments I have seen on gaining new members was made by then RI President Bill Boyd just one year ago. He encouraged us to concentrate on our clubs first, on the basis that strong and vibrant clubs with a good mix of service and fellowship are attractive to new members in there own right. I believe Bill Boyd was right on the mark here.

In my presentations to clubs, I'm using the term "Member Magnet" to describe clubs that can hold current members, attract new ones, and make it all look easy. Make your club a Member Magnet by considering Bill Boyd's observations and working to address any shortcomings. I have also adopted the "theme within a theme", Share Within Rotary. As part of doing our share within Rotary I call on every member to introduce a prospective member to his or her club this year.

- Club Leadership plan implemented in four clubs with another 10 committed to adoption in 2008-09
- To foster involvement in Friendship Exchanges.
- Promote and foster Group 'Matching Grant' projects. The District will consider how unused funds can be best put to work for the betterment of our world.
